Dear Barnard Families,

I hope you all enjoyed the holiday break and you are ready for the new year. We are looking forward to a new year of learning and growing as we finish out the second half of the school year.

As you are aware, students with parent/guardian permission completed the PEAR (Partnerships in Education and Resilience) Holistic Student Assessment earlier this fall. We had a very strong response from our families with 94% participation in grades 3-8. This assessment supports our efforts to promote the positive social-emotional development of our school community and students. We know that helping students feel good about themselves, their school, and their relationships improves learning.

The assessment utilizes the Clover Model, which describes child and adolescent development as a holistic interaction among four core developmental needs: Active Engagement (engaging the world physically), Assertiveness (expressing voice and choice), Belonging (social connection and relationships) and Reflection (thought and meaning-making).

The data collected helps us to better understand our students as individuals and our student body as a whole. We are pleased with the results of the assessment which indicate that overall, our student body is within healthy benchmarks in all four core developmental areas. In particular, the assessment identifies our school's top three strengths in the areas of *Emotional Control (34.04%), School Bonding (29.79%) and Empathy (29.17%).* We attribute this to the work our school counselor and staff have done over the past three years in our SEL programs that focus on understanding emotions and dealing with them appropriately. Additionally, we believe that our emphasis on relationship building within our school through Restorative Practices has helped students to improve in this area.

The assessment also identified three top areas of challenges for our collective student group in the areas of *Relationships with Adults (26.77%)*, *Learning Interest (23.4%) and Relationships with Peers (22.92%)*. We are addressing these challenges through our work with competency-based education, Restorative Practices, and the continuation of our strong SEL program, as well as our cross-grade level buddy groups that meet twice a month.

The Barnard School Spelling Bee (grades 5-8) is underway! The top spellers will compete in the Spelling Bee Finals on January 25 at 12:30pm. The event will take place in the gymnasium. All are welcome to attend.

Our School Newspaper Club has been working hard to publish their first edition of the *Barnard Banner*. Eighteen (18) fifth-eighth grade students joined the new newspaper club this year. Students in grades 3-4 will be invited to submit articles for the newspaper as contributing editors, as well. Be on the lookout for the first edition in the coming weeks!

We are asking for your help in updating Pick-Up Patrol each day. We have had considerable confusion at the end of the day which is causing us to call home to parents to confirm dismissal procedures for students. This is creating bus delays. Your diligence in updating and maintaining this information is invaluable in safeguarding our children. Thank you for your attention to this matter and your commitment to our community's safety.

On behalf of the Barnard School staff, we wish you a happy and healthy new year! We are thankful for your continued support and look forward to a new year with your children.

## **Counselor's Corner**



I love a good mess up! It shows me that I was willing to try something new and challenge myself. We want our students to embrace this growth mindset

- it's ok to mess up and make mistakes . . . It's what you do next that matters! So this month our growth mindset focus is "making mistakes' '. Helping students embrace their mess ups and mistakes is an important part of fostering a growth mindset. Here are three strategies that can be implemented at home and school:

#### **Model a Positive Attitude Towards Mistakes:**

Openly share your own mess ups and mistakes, and talk about how you learned from them - share the struggle and how you felt when you figured out how to fix the problem.

Encourage Reflection: Encourage your student to reflect on their mistakes and, most importantly, what they can learn from them. Help them to brainstorm ideas of what they would do differently next time.

Celebrate Growth and Effort: Rejoice in the mess ups! Recognize and celebrate when your child demonstrates resilience, perseverance, and a willingness to learn from their mistakes, regardless of the outcome.

These strategies, at home and school, create a supportive environment where students feel comfortable taking risks, learning from their mistakes, and continuously growing. Embracing mess ups and mistakes will benefit our students far beyond the classroom!

# **Spanish News**

You might be wondering: What is "Rockalingua?" Designed for grades K-5, it is a music-based Spanish program that includes about 70 different songs. Each song has a cartoon video that covers a theme, such as "Hobbies, "What's your name?" or

"Colors and Numbers." Most of the songs incorporate words or characters from other songs, so there is a lot of repetition, which is great for second language learning. The kids love the songs and it helps them remember vocabulary. Also, most of the songs come with simple computer games, crafts, or other pencil-and-paper activities. Some of them are easy enough to use with the K-1 class, while others are better for older students. Sometimes even the middle schoolers might watch a Rockalingua video! Students in grades 2-5 have access to Rockalingua on their Chromebooks. Ask them to show you the videos and games some time.
